Yuhan Lu, MSN, RN is Director of Nursing Department at Peking University Cancer Hospital. She is research mentor at Peking University Nursing School, and associate president of the Oncology Nursing Committee of Chinese Nurses Association, associate president of the Oncology Nursing Committee of Chinese Anti-cancer Association, member of council of Chinese Nurses Association, member of continuing education committee of Chinese Nurses Association, president of the Oncology Nursing Committee of Beijing Nurses Association, Executive Council of Beijing Nurses Association. In 2014, she and her outstanding team completed the translation of ELNEC- core into Chinese. Then she used her influence and leadership to move palliative care education forward to improve the quality of life of dying patients in China and made great progress. To date, she has published three books as editor-in-chief named Palliative Nursing: a practical guide for oncology nurses, Cancer nursing: a handbook for nurses and Cancer nursing: a textbook for oncology specialized nurse. Tateaki Naito, MD, PhD, is a chief physician of the division of thoracic oncology in Shizuoka Cancer Center, Japan. He graduated the Hamamatsu University School of Medicine, Graduate School in 2007. He has more than 20 years' experience in clinical practice and research in thoracic oncology and supportive care in cancer. Recently, he works as a core member of the cachexia study group in the Japanese Association of Supportive Care in Cancer and conducts clinical trials of multimodal intervention for cancer cachexia. The program combines nutritional counseling, home-based resistance training, and nurse-led physical activity counseling, which aims to promote behavioral changes in daily activity based on the pedometer analysis. So far, multidisciplinary supportive care teams were established in 16 Japanese institutions. Through these activities, he contributes to the

Maryam Rassouli, RN, PhD is an associate professor in the Nursing Department of Shahid Beheshti University of Medical Sciences and at the same time, works as the director general of health promotion & nursing services office at the Ministry of Health & Medical Education, Tehran, Iran. Dr. Rassouli is one of the researchers interested in cancer and palliative care. She has been the supervisor of more than 80 PhD dissertations and Master's theses of nursing. Due to the need to develop a comprehensive plan for palliative care in cancer patients, she has supervised most of the researches of the mentioned students to develop palliative care delivery structure, symptom management guidelines and design tools to measure the requirements and the outcomes of care for patients with cancer. She is the co-author of three book chapters on palliative care.
